Priority Sectors during COVID-19

On 28 March 2020 the Northern Ireland Executive (the Executive) established the NI Engagement Forum (the Forum), a collaboration of business organisations, trade unions and key statutory bodies, to advise Government on how best to manage the challenge of COVID-19 as it applies to the NI Economy / Labour Market.

COVID-19 pandemic is primarily a public health crisis and in providing advice to the Executive, the Forum's number one priority has been the preservation of life.

The Executive has published a list of priority sectors and a practical guide to make workplaces safer, based on the advice of the Forum. The list of priority sectors is advisory and will continue to be a live document; and is intended to enable those businesses operating within the named sectors, and importantly those that form part of the extensive supply chain supporting the provision of priority goods and services, to continue to operate. Employers within a priority sector should assist their downstream supply chains by confirming in writing their importance to their continued operation.

The Executive has been clear that no one should leave home without a justifiable reason, and that includes the requirement to travel to work; and this message is re-affirmed in the safety guide developed by the Forum.

Employers and their workforce have a shared responsibility to ensure lives are not exposed to unnecessary risk while enabling priority sectors within the economy to continue to function, to allow for the provision of essential goods and services, avoid significant job losses and maintain incomes.

This guidance is for companies critical to local, national and global supply chains that are responding to the COVID-19 crisis, and other companies that perform critical global roles. Businesses, which supply priority sectors, including downstream suppliers and subcontractors, are also covered by this guidance.

Some sectors will not fall within the list of priority sectors but are able to continue to operate with staff working from home; and these business operations should continue. Similarly, priority sector businesses should facilitate remote working as far as possible.

Many firms have already successfully repurposed in response to the increasing demand from priority sectors and are playing a huge role in sustaining life. These initiatives are hugely welcomed and to be encouraged. Therefore, any business that does not immediately identify as part of the agreed priority sectors has the opportunity to repurpose, to provide goods or services critical to the fight against COVID 19.

The current list of priority sectors is a live and fluid document, which will be updated to reflect any Executive agreed changes to the Health Protection (Coronavirus Restrictions) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2020 and advice from the NI Engagement Forum.
